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Message from the Chair, Helen Burstyn



It continues to be an honour to serve as Chair of the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF). Everywhere I go in Ontario, I see first-hand the impact OTF grants, volunteers and staff are having in all parts of the province – urban, rural and remote.

Grantees pull me aside to tell me how OTF support has changed their lives or changed their community, and always for the better. Fellow Board members and Grant Review Team volunteers report how their site visits with organizations leave them filled with admiration for the creativity, vision and commitment of local communities.

I share their enthusiasm. I know that OTF helps community organizers strengthen our social fabric and build stronger, better communities. The range and reach of our funding is remarkable. An after-school program that gives at-risk youth a better chance of staying in school. A new vehicle for a northern Ontario seniors club allows aging residents to keep their appointments and remain healthy, active and involved in local events. Expanded sports programs that open new opportunities for young girls to participate on teams and get regular physical activity. Arts, cultural and integration programs that help newcomers feel welcome in their communities. These are among the countless examples of groups who are making their communities and our province better places to live, work and play.

At the start of the fiscal year the Ontario Government reaffirmed its commitment to OTF, providing an additional \$10 million in funding to bring our annual budget to \$120 million. In the context of Ontario's economic challenges, this announcement was most gratifying, and provided proof once again of the key role that OTF plays in building communities.

In 2009-2010, the Foundation invested \$108,528,300 in 1,458 grants to charitable and not-for-profit organizations in our four funding sectors across the province:

- We contributed more than \$47.4 million to grants in the human and social services sector;
- We supported the sports and recreation sector with more than \$24.1 million in grants;
- We invigorated the arts and culture sector with more than \$22.9 million in funding; and
- We dedicated more than \$13.9 million to the not-for-profit environment sector.

The OTF Future Fund continues to live up to its name by supporting forward-thinking and innovative investments that strengthen Ontario's future. We have invested a total of \$10 million in Future Fund grants since 2007.

In 2009 the Future Fund program granted \$2 million to organizations creating employment and economic opportunities for a wide range of range of Ontarians – from displaced industrial workers and single moms in southern Ontario, to women entrepreneurs in Thunder Bay, and First Nation forestry technician trainees in Northern Ontario. At a time when so many have felt vulnerable in a faltering economy, the Fund's strategic support continues to bolster their prospects.

Early in 2010 another \$2 million from the Future Fund program was granted to organizations focused on building capacity and job skills so that individuals (and communities) can participate in Ontario's growing green economy. We have provided significant support for the expansion of innovative green jobs and related skills-training programs through collaborations and partnerships that have helped build the capacity of the environmental not-for-profit sector in Ontario.

Each year, I am amazed and inspired by the commitment, dedication and unflagging support of our Board of Directors and Grant Review Team members – all hardworking volunteers. Their dedication is vital to the Foundation's success, and I am truly fortunate to work with such a talented and effective group of people from all parts of the province.

I would like to also recognize and thank the Honourable Michael Chan, Minister of Tourism and Culture, for his vigorous support and constant encouragement. He is a champion of our Foundation and the work of the not-for-profit organizations we support.

Across the province, our highly committed and capable OTF staff members work with and for communities, and support our local volunteers. Expertly led by CEO L. Robin Cardozo, the Foundations' staff members are the backbone of our organization, enabling our success, as well as that of our grantees.

I have often described the not-for-profit sector as a stabilizing, invigorating and entrepreneurial part of our society that is crucial to our collective well-being. I couldn't be more proud of the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the important work it has done for the past 28 years, and continues to do every day in every part of this province.

Message from the Chief Executive Officer, L. Robin Cardozo



Ontario not-for-profit and charitable organizations showed their resiliency and maturity this year as they continued to feel the ripple effects of the global economic downturn. We saw that persistence on many occasions, from our daily contact with the more than 4,000 community groups we support in a given year, to our community consultations and research initiatives.

OTF remains a committed ally and advocate for the not-for-profit sector. We continue to look for every opportunity to serve as a true partner to organizations small and large, to amplify their efforts to build healthy and vibrant communities across Ontario.

2009-2010 was a very busy and productive year for the Foundation's research, consulting and community services. Following up on our 110 Challenging Times conversations first held in January 2009, the OTF returned in the fall to ask the same Ontario not-for-profit organizations how they were faring 10 months into the economic downturn. We asked what actions they had taken to cope with lowered donations, sponsorship or funding as well as higher demands for services.

We heard organizations were struggling, but coping. More than 75% said they were feeling the effects of the recession – up from 30% in January 2009. Two out of three experienced declines in funding. But we also heard stories of resiliency. We saw an appetite for collaboration and innovation. Organizations are using these challenging times to re-assess, re-tool, do things differently or explore ways to generate new revenues.

The Foundation also heard from not-for-profit and community leaders directly, convening round tables in 14 communities from Cornwall to Sioux Lookout. Not-for-profit leaders mixed with those from local businesses, municipalities, school boards and government agencies for a positive, constructive and action-oriented day of discussions on what could or would make their communities stronger, and what OTF could do to help.

In the spring OTF gathered youth, youth organizers and adults who work with youth to ignite a province-wide discussion on creating a youth 'social infrastructure' – a flexible collaborative network that would build, then sustain, the capacity of youth leaders and youth-led organizations over the long term.

Acting on a survey of our own grantees, OTF improved its customer service. We launched a province-wide on-line application process, making it easier, faster and less costly for groups to apply for grants. We further improved our website and hosted roundtables with ethnic community media outlets.

We made greater use of digital and social networking technologies. We gathered, organized and shared OTF's research both amongst OTF regional staff and with not-for-profits small and large, urban, rural and remote. We will continue to use a range of on-line tools (including WordPress, UserVoice, CommunityZero and Meetup) as cost-effective means to facilitate our role as a sector leader, conveyor and collaborator.

We were pleased to host a Great Grants Awards reception to honour charitable and not-for-profit organizations that have had an exceptional impact in their communities. Two other noteworthy projects this year were the Foundation's pandemic response plan and implementation of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act.

I would like to express my gratitude to the Foundation's volunteer Board of Directors and Grant Review Team members, who continued to impress with their commitment, knowledge and passion. I extend a personal thank-you to Chair Helen Burstyn for her leadership and her tireless enthusiasm and energy. My gratitude also goes to our hardworking professional staff for they are invaluable to our success.

The next year promises to be a full of opportunities and challenges. We will enhance our role as catalyst and convenor, and harvest and share our knowledge with our sector partners, community organizations and fellow funders. We look forward to continuing our work to strengthen the capacity of Ontario's volunteer sector.

Accountability, Impact and Organizational Effectiveness

Ontario Trillium Foundation Review of 2008-2009 Achievements

The Ontario Trillium Foundation Business Plan for the year covered three major performance goals, each with supporting objectives. The following summarizes the organization's achievements relative to those goals and objectives.

Goal 1 | Make investments to build healthy and vibrant communities and strengthen the capacity of the voluntary sector

Objective 1 | Make Grants to Achieve Priorities

Achievements:

- Allocated 100% of the year's granting budget, by granting program and by catchment area, subject to modest variations.
- Achieved granting targets within sector allocation ranges by granting 21% of funds in the arts and culture sector, 13% in the environment sector, 44% in the human and social services sector and 22% in the sports and recreation sector.
- Significantly increased OTF granting in the environment sector: over the past four years granting in this sector has grown from \$7.6 million (2005/2006) to \$13.9 million (2009/2010).
- Achieved granting targets in the four granting priority areas. Granting under the "enhanced employment and economic potential" priority was \$15.8 million, up over the previous year, and more than double the 2007/2008 figure of \$7.0 million.
- Granted \$4 million through two Future Fund initiatives: Creating Innovative Economic Opportunities and Building Skills for the Green Economy.

Objective 2 | Enhance the Impact of OTF Grants

Achievements:

- Continued the "high engagement" approach to evaluating and monitoring Future Fund grants, in order to enhance their impact and learn from their results.
- Completed an analysis of OTF granting for capacity building over the past five years, and identified new areas for enhanced capacity building.
- Began working with a group of funders on how to improve evaluation practices and outcome reporting in the not-for-profit sector.
- In a funding partnership with the Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration, made grants to improve the capacity of Ontario's voluntary organizations, with particular emphasis on small and mid-sized groups outside urban centres. Additional funding received near the end of 2009/2010 will be used to continue this work in the upcoming fiscal year.
- For every \$10 granted over the past three years, grant recipients reported they leveraged an average of an additional \$20 in volunteer time, in-kind contributions, and direct funding from other sources.

Accountability, Impact and Organizational Effectiveness

Objective 3 | Strengthen the Foundation's Role as a Leader and Convenor

Achievements:

- Continued implementation of the Foundation's knowledge management strategy and convening plan to extend the Foundation's role in providing support to the not-for-profit sector beyond its granting dollars.
- The major convening events of the year were the biennial Great Grants Awards luncheon and OTF Professional Development Conference, held in November 2009.
- Convened a series of fundraising workshops with Kim Klein, an internationally recognized consultant in the field of grassroots fundraising, in Kenora, Thunder Bay, Windsor, London, Toronto and Kingston.
- Published the results of the second phase of "Challenging Times," research on the impact of the economic downturn on Ontario's not-for-profit sector.
- Building on this research, hosted roundtables in communities across the province, in order to identify shifting community needs and opportunities. Continue to work with groups that have come together as a result of these roundtables to support local collaborative initiatives in response to the economic downturn.
- Provided support to, and participated in, numerous conferences and other events, including those convened by Maytree Foundation, the Circle on Aboriginal Grantmaking and the Ontario Nonprofit Network.
- Published the first of several "drill down" reports based on 2006 Census data. A statistical profile of Ontario's Francophone community, based on the province's new definition of "Franco-Ontarian" was produced in partnership with Statistics Canada and Ontario's Office of Francophone Affairs.

Objective 4 | Enhance the Equity and Accessibility of OTF Funding

Achievements:

- Carried out targeted outreach to encourage grant applications from under-served and under-privileged populations, including Aboriginal, Francophone, ethnocultural, racial, northern and rural groups, as well as groups in urban priority neighbourhoods.
- Outreach to Aboriginal communities included an emphasis on applicants who have not approached OTF in the past, while Francophone outreach increased focus on newcomer Francophone organizations.
- Granting to First Nations, Métis, and Aboriginal communities totalled \$7.3 million, up from \$3.0 million in 2005/06, while granting to Francophone communities was \$7.7 million, up considerably from historic levels of \$5.0 to \$6.0 million (these figures not including grants that serve multiple communities).
- Began working with a group of funders on streamlining and harmonizing OTF application and reporting requirements. As part of the Foundation's multi-year business process transformation project, simplified the type and number of application questions.
- Continued to focus on increased capital grant funding in lower budget catchment areas.

Goal 2 | Build on the Board's work on OTF strategic directions and implement the results of its 2008/2009 strategic positioning review

Achievements:

- Conducted a review of the Foundation's strategic opportunities and endorsed a three-year plan for implementation beginning in 2010/2011.
- Continued implementation of the results of the 2008/2009 strategic positioning review, including knowledge-sharing, convening, and other services that add value beyond grantmaking.

Goal 3 | Enhance Organizational Effectiveness

Achievements:

To help ensure a continuing high level of effectiveness in the Foundation's governance, business, communications and granting practices, in 2009/2010 the Foundation:

- Provided access to an online application process for organizations in all areas of the province, following the pilot phase of the business process transformation project.
- Carried out the annual grantee compliance audit – which complements the Foundation's monitoring of every grant – and implemented recommendations from previous internal audit reports.
- Maintained a high ranking as a cost-effective foundation.
- Held a successful professional development conference in November 2009, with a high level of participant satisfaction.
- Maintained and enhanced the Foundation's pro-active communications strategy. Specific achievements included the facilitation of more than 700 grantee recognition events, increased requests for the online newsletter OTF News, and the completion of five roundtable discussions involving more than 40 ethnic media representatives. Media coverage generated by recognition events and grants announcements in addition to the Great Grants Awards and other events and announcements reached 67 million readers/viewers. The Great Grants Awards program was honoured with an International Association of Business Communicators, Toronto Chapter, Ovation Award of Merit.
- Finalized OTF's pandemic response plan.

Our leadership depends on skilled staff working in productive partnership with knowledgeable volunteers who understand the needs of local communities in their region. Our staff and volunteer human resources practices foster this creative synergy.

Inclusiveness and innovation

Our policies and programs acknowledge that the people of Ontario are diverse and dynamic and that community needs differ across the province. We support creative initiatives that respond to the real needs of Ontario's varied and evolving communities.

Integrity and respect

Our grant decision-making processes, business practices and communications strategies are governed by the principles of honesty, integrity and fairness. We treat all stakeholders respectfully, including volunteers, staff, grant applicants and members of the public.

Efficiency and impact

We are determined to ensure that public funds are well invested and that our grantmaking and grant-monitoring processes are cost efficient. We consistently measure and evaluate results based on grant outcomes.

Our Granting Priorities

The Foundation will support the building of healthy and vibrant communities through community-based initiatives that strengthen the capacity of organizations in the arts and culture, environment, human and social services and sports and recreation sectors.

In particular, the Foundation will place priority on supporting organizations that work in the following areas to help Ontarians achieve their potential.

Enhanced success for students and learners

A healthy and vibrant community depends on the skills and knowledge of its members.

Whether knowledge and skills are developed in the early years when children start school or much later in life, it is key that people of all ages and abilities are ready to learn. This is why the Ontario Trillium Foundation will place priority on initiatives that:

- Provide community-based learning opportunities and create conditions for achievement for people of all ages and abilities; and
- Help prepare children and youth for success.



This includes, but is not limited to, broadening learning experiences for children and youth; helping children and youth remain and achieve in school; preparing young children to learn; providing opportunities for children and youth to experience positive personal growth; and improving adult literacy through resources and activities.

Healthier and more physically active Ontarians

Encouraging Ontarians to lead healthier lifestyles, as well as improving other determinants of health, such as air and water quality, and providing opportunities for people to enhance their health and well-being will lead to healthier and more physically active Ontarians. To this end, the Ontario Trillium Foundation will place priority on initiatives that:

- Promote physical activity for people of all ages and abilities;
- Promote recreational activities for people of all ages and abilities;
- Enhance and help protect human and ecosystem health;
- Create conditions for people to reach their full health and well-being potential; and
- Promote cultural and artistic activities for people of all ages and abilities.



This includes, but is not limited to, promoting and increasing physical activity; increasing or sustaining recreational and leisure opportunities; helping communities take responsibility to protect the natural environment; supporting systems that sustain health and well-being; sustaining a healthy arts community; and celebrating and preserving heritage.

Our Granting Priorities

Enhanced employment and economic potential for workers and their families

The Ontario Trillium Foundation supports initiatives that are innovative and that stimulate economic growth. To this end, OTF will place priority on proposals that support organizations to build skills, create jobs and enhance economic potential for individuals and communities through initiatives that:



- Provide skill development or employment opportunities;
- Sustain and promote a greener economy and community;
- Strengthen the economic health of a community; and
- Help further a community's long-term vision and growth.

This includes, but is not limited to, increasing opportunities for employment for those experiencing barriers including Aboriginal people, newcomers, people with disabilities and youth who are at risk; strengthening organizations and supporting initiatives that promote a sustainable environment; sustaining the economic viability of the community and encouraging community planning processes.

More effective volunteers and more people engaged in their communities

Volunteers are the foundation of healthy and caring communities that are safe, clean, secure and vibrant. Providing people with opportunities to actively participate in activities or programs offered within their community also contributes to this. We support initiatives that:



- Create conditions to increase community engagement of people of all ages, abilities and cultures;
- Strengthen volunteerism among people of all ages, abilities and cultures; and
- Strengthen the voluntary sector.

This includes, but is not limited to, building community connections and awareness; promoting and increasing volunteerism, particularly among young people; enhancing the capacity of the volunteer sector and fostering strategic thinking and innovation; and building the capacity of charitable and not-for-profit organizations.

OTF Grants Foster Innovative Economic Development



Enhancing employment and economic potential for Ontarians and their families is one of four grant-making priorities for the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

The year's economic downturn has significantly impacted many in the province. The Foundation has an opportunity to help Ontarians build healthy and vibrant communities by supporting community-based initiatives and organizations that foster economic opportunity and ready a broad range of job skills for Ontarians of all backgrounds.

The Foundation awarded grants to organizations working to increase economic opportunities for Ontarians as part of its mandate to support four sectors: arts and culture, human and social services, sports and recreation and the environment.

The following grants reflect the diversity of OTF's granting and the significant initiatives making communities stronger across the province.

Province-Wide

Social and Enterprise Development Innovations

With the onset of the recent financial downturn, debt and credit counseling services have become critical. Financial literacy is an approach to poverty reduction (and by extension, community wellbeing) that focuses on helping people to understand the essentials of money management, and the personal know-how to save money, invest and build assets.

Thanks in part to a \$596,900 grant, this organization works with more than 75 community organizations in 15 Ontario communities, many of them in rural and remote Northern Ontario, to train local staff to deliver financial literacy education to 2,000 Ontarians, including Aboriginal peoples, families with children, newcomers, women and youth at risk.

Muskoka, Nipissing, Parry Sound, Timiskaming

NECO—Community Futures Development Corporation

Trends in employment indicate that, whether due to stage-of-life, contracting out or restructuring, more workers of all ages are turning to self-employment. These individuals can benefit from training in entrepreneurial and small business skills.

With the help of an OTF grant of \$100,500, Stepping Stones – La Passerelle Business Incubator helps new businesses in North Bay and area receive the day-to-day and mentorship support they need to survive and thrive, from business support, learning and networking opportunities to mentorship and shared office space.

Niagara

Interactive Niagara Media Cluster

Digital communications is increasingly centred on mobile technologies, and with that focus comes the opportunity for business and job opportunities in the emerging interactive media sector. Niagara Interactive Media Generator (nGen) is a hub for digital interactive media projects and business development in St. Catharines and the Niagara Region and serves as an incubator to grow new enterprises.

With the support of an OTF grant for \$54,300, nGen is developing a prototype created by Brock University students to create the Niagara 1812 Interactive Experience, a hybrid reality game. The game will bring the region's War of 1812 experience directly to a tourist's smart phone – in time for the 2012 bicentennial celebrations.

Hamilton, Halton

Coopérative de couture UMOJA

Newcomers to Ontario frequently have a difficult time finding suitable employment.

The Foundation provided \$25,000 over 12 months to support a feasibility study to explore a sewing cooperative for Francophone immigrant women wishing to put their sewing and design skills to work. The co-op would specialize in the creation, manufacturing and sale of traditional African and North American clothing and provide a learning and training ground for Francophone immigrants the Hamilton, Milton and Burlington areas.

Champlain

TeKnoWave Inc.

The green economy is an emerging sector in Ontario with considerable potential for jobs and economic growth. OTF is playing a role to help individuals gain the skills they need to answer the demand for qualified human resources as the sector expands.

TeKnoWave, which specializes in IT and sustainable energy training programs for Aboriginal peoples, is helping Ottawa-area Aboriginal adults and youth to prepare for the green economy. With a 12-month \$61,000 OTF grant, the organization is developing in-class curriculum, providing job counselling, career support, coaching and mentoring and initiating pilot partnerships with First Nation communities and contractors.

Simcoe-York

York South Simcoe Training and Adjustment Board

Ontarians with disabilities continue to face considerable barriers to employment. The Foundation provided \$47,500 over two years to help increase the employment opportunities for people with disabilities in York Region.

This organization collaborated with the One Voice Group (composed of 21 service providers and government agencies) to launch a website to serve as a central point of access for information for job-seekers with disabilities, service providers and employers seeking to hire people with disabilities. The website will be useful to the region's 26,000 small and medium businesses looking for information about hiring people with disabilities, the availability of wage or accommodation subsidies or sensitivity and equity employment training.

Durham Haliburton Kawartha, Pine Ridge

North Hastings Community Integration (Collaborative)

Increased financial literacy and better budgeting skills for low income earners is the goal of this new collaborative in the Bancroft area. Three organizations – North Hastings Community Integration Association, Families First and North Hastings Community Trust – were responding to stark statistics: one in three Bancroft households is receiving some form of social assistance and the local unemployment rate is much higher than the provincial average.

A grant of \$64,800 has enabled the collaborative to establish a credit counselling and financial management service that helps individuals get themselves out of debt and live to the best of their potential on the income they have.

Future Fund focuses on new approaches, new opportunities

The Ontario Trillium Foundation's Future Fund is a \$4 million a year initiative designed to enhance the future of Ontario's communities.

In the 2009-2010 the Future Fund focused on innovative initiatives that create social and economic opportunities for Ontarians and initiatives that would build skills for the green economy.

The following grants represent two of the innovative initiatives that received funding this fiscal year:

Creating Innovative Economic opportunities

Pikangikum First Nation

Pikangikum First Nation is a small community with a big idea: Infuse indigenous knowledge and stewardship of northern Ontario forests into the forestry college curriculum, then teach that new curriculum to First Nations students so they can get good, sustainable jobs right in their home community.

With the help of a \$465,000 three-year Future Fund Grant, Pikangikum First Nation elders are working with Confederation College and other partners to – for the first time – develop and incorporate indigenous knowledge and forest stewardship into the Forest Eco-System Management Technician program. This will substantially change the way resource management is taught and carried out in northern Ontario.

The first of its kind, the "Whitefeather Forest Generative Curriculum Project" will train and qualify First Nation youth to work as forestry technicians in the Whitefeather Forest and in local forest products industry businesses or go on to take a university forestry degree program.

Building skills for the Green Economy

Biomass Innovation Centre at Nipissing University (Collaborative)

The efforts of the Biomass Network Group will help to set the stage for the development of the biofuels and biomaterials industry within Ontario's forest and agricultural sectors and help fuel the economic growth of Northern Ontario through clean technologies.

The Biomass Network Group seeks to help Northern Ontario communities diversify their economies by using a local resource - primarily wood chips and pelletized wood - as a biomass with which to produce a clean, affordable, renewable, carbon-friendly fuel for heating and energy.

A consortium of trade, commerce, education, and heating/energy businesses and organizations, municipalities and institutions, the Group is collaborating with the Biomass Innovation Centre at Nipissing University in North Bay to put in place the training infrastructure needed to grow the workforce for biofuel and biomaterial technologies.

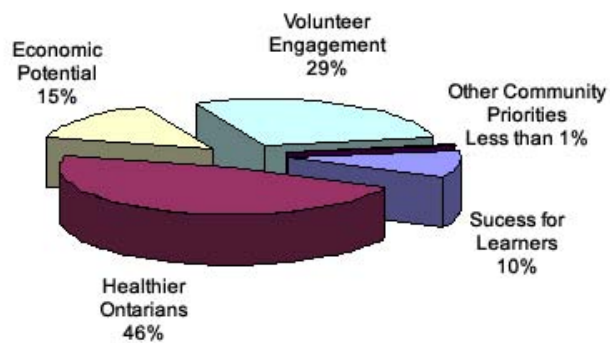
OTF provided \$565,000 to see new skills and educational programs developed on biomass, including courses in mechanical and civil engineering, a new course on biofuels/ biomaterials for steamfitters in the Ontario Apprenticeship Program, and the establishment of a new certificate program for biofuels/biomaterial harvester workers. The courses and training programs will be developed and delivered in partnership with Lakehead and Laurentian Universities. The funding will also provide training and skills development needed by members of Nipissing First Nation to operate a new wood pellet mill.

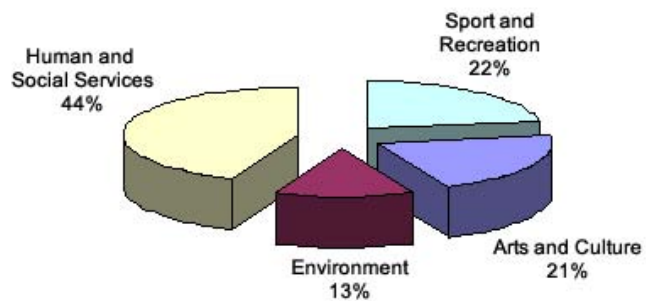
OTF Overall Grants by Priority - From April 1, 2009 to March 31, 2010

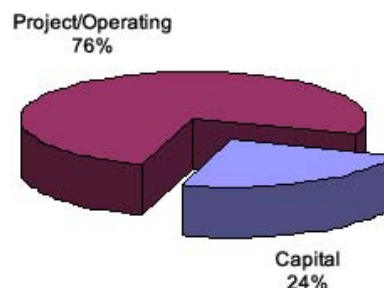
OTF Overall Grants by Sector - From April 1, 2009 to March 31, 2010

Report on Financial Performance

Ontario Trillium Foundation, March 31, 2010

- In 2009-2010, the Ontario Trillium Foundation received \$120.0 million from the Ministry of Tourism and Culture for its granting programs. (\$119.3 million is recorded in the Statement of Operations; the remaining \$700,000 is recorded in deferred contributions, for spending in the following year.) Other revenue sources include investment income (\$661,000), funds made available as a result of rescinded grants (\$1.8 million), and \$180,000 from the Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration for a funding partnership to be carried out in the following year.
- Of this funding, \$108.5 million was pledged for grants, and grantmaking expenses, services to the community, support services, and amortization together amounted to \$13.2 million.
- At March 31, 2010, the Foundation held approximately \$116.9 million in investments, in fixed income securities (short-term treasury bills, bankers' acceptances, and government bonds). Most of these funds (\$111.3 million) are committed to multi-year grant pledges. The Foundation's investments are managed by the Ontario Financing Authority.
- Funds may be recovered, or future payments rescinded, in cases where circumstances (e.g. planned activities, budgets) change or where grant conditions or performance objectives are not met.
- Accumulated net assets at year-end totalled almost \$2.6 million, of which approximately \$700,000 was invested in capital assets and \$1.9 million represented unrestricted assets.
- Volunteers make a significant contribution to the operations of the Foundation. Given the difficulty of estimating monetary value, these contributions are not reflected in the financial statements.

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AUDITORS' REPORT



Year ended March 31, 2010

The Ontario Trillium Foundation (the "Foundation" or "OTF"), an agency of the Ministry of Tourism and Culture (the "Ministry"), is financially supported by the Ontario government. OTF began operations as an arm's-length agency of the Ontario government on August 23, 1982 and was incorporated without share capital under the laws of Ontario under letters patent dated November 17, 1982. OTF's purpose is to build healthy and vibrant communities throughout Ontario, by strengthening the capacity of the voluntary sector through investments in community-based initiatives.

Government funding is subject to Memoranda of Understanding that define how the funds must be invested and distributed.

1. Significant accounting policies:

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles applied within the framework of the significant accounting policies summarized below:

(a) Revenue recognition:

OTF follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions, which include government funding. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Externally restricted contributions are deferred and recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Investment income is recorded on the accrual basis.

(b) Financial instruments:

Short-term investments, being treasury bills, bankers' acceptances and bonds, are classified as held-for-trading investments. Short-term investments are carried at fair value as determined at the fiscal year end based on market values for the debt securities.

Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of investments are not considered significant and are expensed when paid.

Investment purchase and sale transactions are accounted for on the settlement date.

Cash consists of cash on hand and in banks.

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

Accounts payable and accrued liabilities and grants payable are classified as other financial liabilities and measured at amortized cost.

In accordance with the Accounting Standards Board's decision to exempt not-for-profit organizations from the disclosure requirements with respect to financial instruments contained within The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants' ("CICA") Handbook Section 3862, Financial Instruments - Disclosures, and Section 3863, Financial Instruments - Presentation, the Foundation has elected not to adopt these standards in its financial statements.

(c) Grants:

Grants are recorded as expenses in the year that the Foundation approves the grant.

(d) Allocation of support services expenses:

The Foundation classifies expenses on the statement of operations by function. The entity allocates certain costs by identifying the appropriate basis of allocating and applying that basis consistently each year. The Foundation allocates its support services expenses proportionately on a per capita basis.

(e) Capital assets:

Capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization is provided on a straight-line basis over the following periods:

(f) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. Changes in accounting policies:

The CICA has issued revisions to the Section 4400 series of standards which related to not-for-profit organizations.

(a) Amendments to Section 4400, Not for Profit Accounting Standards ("Section 4400"):

Effective April 1, 2009, the Foundation adopted the amendments to CICA Handbook Section 4400. Adoption of these recommendations had no significant impact on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2010.

(b) Amendments to Section 1000, Financial Statements Concepts ("Section 1000"):

Effective April 1, 2009, the Foundation adopted the amendments to CICA Handbook Section 1000. These amendments clarified the criteria for recognition of an asset or liability, removing the ability to recognize assets or liabilities solely on the basis of matching of revenue and expense items. Adoption of these recommendations had no effect on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2010.

(c) Disclosure of Allocated Expenses by Not-for-Profit Organizations:

Effective April 1, 2009, the Foundation adopted CICA Handbook Section 4470, Disclosure of Allocated Expenses by Not-for-Profit Organizations which establishes disclosure standards for entities that choose to classify their expenses by function and allocate expenses from one function to another. The applicable disclosure is included in note 6.

2. Changes in accounting policies (continued):

The Foundation allocates certain of its support services expenses based on the proportion of the total staff directly involved with grantmaking and services to the community. The following percentages were used to calculate the allocation: grantmaking 72% (2009 - 72%) and services to the community 3% (2009 - 3%). The calculation results in an allocation of \$3,052,498 (2009 - \$3,067,505) to grantmaking expenses and \$113,195 (2009 - \$116,487) to services to the community. Support services reported in the statement of operations are \$1,041,395 (2009 - \$1,056,153).

All investments are in fixed income securities and mature within the next six months (2009 - three months). These investments bear interest from 0.2% to 0.5% (2009 - 0.9% to 1.1%). Investment in bonds includes bonds issued by Canada Housing Trust, provincial government of Ontario and Hydro Quebec.

The Ontario Financing Authority acts as OTF's investment manager under an investment management agreement that adheres to OTF's policies and procedures governing risk and also includes additional risk concern measures.

Risk management relates to the understanding and active management of risks associated with all areas of the business and the associated operating environment. Investments are primarily exposed to interest rate, credit and market risks. OTF has formal policies and procedures in place to address these risks.

3. Investments (continued):

Interest rate risk arises from the possibility that changes in interest rates will affect the value of fixed income securities held by OTF. The Foundation manages this risk by holding debt issued by the Government of Canada and large Canadian banks, and by staggering the terms of the securities held.

Credit risk arises from the non-performance by counterparties to the investments. This risk is minimized by dealing only with creditworthy counterparties.

Market risk arises as a result of trading fixed income securities. Fluctuations in the market expose OTF to a risk of loss. The Foundation mitigates this risk through controls to monitor and limit concentration levels.

8. Commitments (continued):

In relation to these leases, OTF has agreed to indemnify the Landlord against losses occurring on the lease premises which may arise out of a breach of the lease agreement.

9. Indemnification of officers and directors:

OTF has indemnified its past, present and future directors, officers, employees and volunteers against expenses (including legal expenses), judgements, and any amount actually or reasonably incurred by them in connection with any action, suit or proceeding in which the directors are sued as a result of their service, if they acted honestly and in good faith with a view to the best interests of OTF. The nature of the indemnity prevents OTF from reasonably estimating the maximum exposure. OTF has purchased directors' and officers' liability insurance with respect to this indemnification.

10. Financial instruments:

The carrying values of cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and grants payable approximate their fair values due to the relatively short periods to maturity of these financial instruments or because they are receivable or payable on demand.

The fair value of investments and related risks are disclosed in note 3.

11. Comparative figures:

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted in the current year.
