

## Toronto 1999 - 2000

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### **A Space**

\$75,000 over six months to support the launch of CAB 2000, a multidisciplinary event celebrating community arts, and presenting the work of diverse artists and grass roots communities at a variety of venues throughout Toronto, May 13 - July 15, 2000.

### **Adventure Place**

\$155,200 over three years to establish the Villaways Community House and programs to support children, youth and parents, and to expand participation in the Villaways Resource Group.

### **The African Canadian Heritage Association**

\$25,000 over one year to research the impact of the Association's 30-year history and its role in participants' success, culminating in a symposium to investigate future directions of African Canadian Heritage programming.

### **Agincourt Community Services Association**

\$75,000 over three years to operate a community catering project that will allow participants to acquire business and job skills by selling healthy meals to customers and their families.

### **Albion Neighbourhood Services**

\$207,400 over five years to support a newly established Boys and Girls Club that will offer social and recreational programs to children and youth.

### **ALDERCentre**

\$90,000 over three years to support an employment program for persons aged 16 to 65 with learning disabilities, in 3 phases: assessment, pre-employment skills/transition to work, & accommodation to employment.

### **The Amadeus Choir of Greater Toronto**

\$32,000 over one year to implement a variety of initiatives, including marketing, membership development and outreach, designed to increase the capacity and effectiveness of the organization.

### **Anishnawbe Health Toronto**

\$275,900 over five years. to support the implementation of the Biindged Program, an initiative that works to get homeless Aboriginal men & women off the streets of Toronto & into more stable & rewarding lifestyles.

### **Anna Livia Productions**

\$4,000 over one year to support a weeklong Bloomsday festival of readings, music, & celebration of the Irish writer, James Joyce.

### **Anne Johnston Health Station**

\$10,700 over six months to support a project that will use drama as a tool to bridge communication between persons with disabilities, youth, and seniors.

### **Armenian Community Centre**

\$151,000 over five years to provide capital and project funding for programs such as Economic Stability, Senior Access, Youth Cyber Café, Youth Sports and Hamazkain Cultural Enhancement.

**Arts Etobicoke**

\$130,000 over three years to expand three programs that contribute to the community's artistic and economic development, increase the arts council's organizational effectiveness, and provide outreach to new constituencies through arts education initiatives.

**Arts Toronto**

\$75,000 over three years to expand and diversify ArtsWeek programming and audiences, strengthen its impact on local communities and increase its involvement with local business.

**Ashkenaz Foundation**

\$50,000 over one year to support the organizing and running of the biennial Ashkenaz festival, a Yiddish culture event that attracts adherents of pre-holocaust Yiddish culture from across Canada and around the world as well as other interested people.

**Basketball Ontario**

\$20,000 over two years to implement a youth outreach program for visible minority youth from the Greater Toronto Area to participate in various aspects of organized basketball, including skills development, coaching, officiating, league play and tournaments.

**Bathurst Jewish Centre**

\$170,000 over three years to support a variety of initiatives, including customer service training, volunteer development, camp programs, special needs activities for the physically and mentally challenged, a new exhibit at the Children's Museum, and capital expenses.

**Bloor Jewish Community Centre**

\$75,000 over one year to create a multipurpose theatre by renovating an existing facility.

**Boundless Adventures**

\$45,000 over three years to support an early intervention program for at-risk children (age 2-6) & their families.

**Buddies in Bad Times Theatre**

\$25,000 over six months to support a summer program offering intensive theatre/visual arts training to young people struggling with issues relating to sexual identity. The program includes an historical walking tour of Toronto's gay and lesbian community.

**The Cabbagetown Youth Centre**

\$300,000 over four years to provide sports and recreation programming for children and youth in the St. James Town area in central Toronto.

**Canadian Mental Health Association, Metropolitan Toronto Branch**

\$62,800 over two years to support a community-based partnership designed to deliver culturally and linguistically sensitive mental health education programs to diverse ethno-cultural communities in Toronto.

**The Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Toronto Operations**

\$72,600 over one year to support an initiative designed to enhance services to clients who are visually impaired through integration of CNIB operations in Toronto, and service improvements.

**The Canadian Stage Company**

\$150,000 over three years to assist with the operations of The Dream in High Park, the Canadian Stage Company's annual summer theatre production for families, young people & the community, in High Park's enhanced, natural outdoor amphitheatre.

**Central Toronto Community Health Centres**

\$150,000 over two years for a collaborative of 16 community-based agencies in West Toronto to develop a comprehensive and integrated service model to respond to community needs, with particular attention to seniors, homeless people, low-income families with young children and people who experience mental health problems.

**The Centre for Advancement in Work and Living**

\$87,400 over two years to support an information technology project that will increase the effectiveness of agency operations.

**The Centre for Contemporary Canadian Art**

\$100,000 over two years to provide web access to up to 6,000 artworks by 100 contemporary visual artists and fine craft artists active in Toronto, and to create an on-line image bank of the Av Isaacs Archives, highlighting the formative years of Canada's contemporary art practices.

**Centre francophone du Toronto métropolitain**

\$30,000 over eight months for a strategic plan to clarify the Centre's role and provide future direction regarding services to Toronto's francophone community.

**Children's Own Museum**

\$151,200 over three years for the Children's Own Museum to train new facilitators; for staff and board development; to repair and refurbish two of its play environments; and to produce visitor evaluation cards.

**Christie Ossington Neighbourhood Centre**

\$90,000 over two years to support the programs and operations of the store-front community agency located in central-west Toronto.

**Citizens Concerned About the Future of the Etobicoke Waterfront**

\$10,000 over six months towards a community arts project that will celebrate the natural history of South Etobicoke.

**The Civic Garden Centre**

\$68,000 over one year to automate the Civic Garden Centre Resource Centre, to provide on-line access to its collection, and to provide web access to information on horticulture, gardening, conservation and related recreational and environmental initiatives.

**Common Thread: Community Chorus of Toronto**

\$10,000 over one year to support a newly established community-based chorus that promotes multicultural folk traditions and respect for diversity through singing.

**Coopérative Radiophonique de Toronto**

\$50,000 over one year to fund the establishment of La Coopérative radiophonique de Toronto. To be released upon receipt of a letter confirming their broadcasting license from the CRTC.

**Corpus Dance Projects**

\$10,000 over one year to support the production of Dusk Dances, a summer festival in Toronto bringing contemporary and traditional dance to city public parks.

**COSTI-IIAS Immigrant Services**

\$146,400 over two years to support an employment readiness and skills training program for people with mental health problems who have been diverted from the criminal justice system, on low-risk offenses, to community mental health services and supports.

**Crankee Consort**

\$25,000 over one year to support a summer workshop of a "hip-hop", musical production of The Two Bit Opera; it will be created and performed with the involvement of the youth of the Dufferin Grove basketball court.

**Creating Together**

\$11,000 over one year to purchase playground equipment & toys for a Parent-Child Resource Centre located in Parkdale, a high need community in Toronto's west end.

**CultureLink Settlement Services of Metropolitan Toronto**

\$221,700 over three years to research, develop and implement a youth-led conflict management project for newcomer youth in schools and shelters in the Toronto-area, which fundamentally considers cross-cultural issues related to newcomer youth.

**Dance Umbrella of Ontario**

\$25,000 over five months to support equipment and renovation costs related to the Dance Plant, a new resource centre for emerging and independent dance groups.

**DanceWorks**

\$40,000 over 16 months to implement audience development initiatives to support Danceworks' Mainstage series of contemporary dance and towards the artistic and promotion expenses of the CoWorks partnership series for emerging and innovative artists.

**Danny Grossman Dance Company**

\$25,000 over one year for education initiatives such as Noondance, an in-class tutorial with an in-studio student matinee; The Cabbagetown School Residency Project, a focussed relationship with one class over 10 to 12 weeks, culminating in a performance; and Repertory Etudes, a multi-media archival activity to preserve significant works of the company for future teaching and historical use.

**Disabled Sailing Association of Ontario**

\$100,000 over three years to provide start-up communications and programming costs and to support a program coordinator for the Queen's Quay Disabled Sailing program.

**Dixon Hall Neighbourhood Centre**

\$350,000 over five years to support a comprehensive range of programs and services for disadvantaged children and youth from the Regent Park community, including a music program and programs and services for high risk youth, children (aged 0 to 6), and their parents.

**The Downtown Churchworkers' Association**

\$98,500 over three years to initiate an Inner City Recreational Summer Day-Camp Program for children (aged 8 to 12) and to upgrade computer hardware and software.

**Earth Council Institute - Canada**

\$12,000 over nine months to organize the Toronto Youth Winter Workshop, a Teacher's Forum, to produce a Youth Handbook and a Training Manual, as a part of the Toronto Youth Ecological Monitoring Exchange ("Eco-Exchange") Project.

**East End Community Health Centre**

\$75,000 over one year for a collaborative of 16 agencies to implement a train-the-trainer nutrition program designed to increase nutritional food intake in disadvantaged communities.

**East York Learning Experience**

\$26,500 over three years to provide educational workshops with its literacy program, provide training to volunteers, and pilot the use of the Internet as a literacy training tool.

**Emery Creek Environmental Association**

\$74,000 over three years to expand & increase the capacity of the Emery Creek Environmental Association (ECEA) to pursue a greater degree of outreach, education, awareness & implementation of Pollution Prevention in the Emery Creek Watershed.

**Eritrean Canadian Community Centre of Metropolitan Toronto**

\$51,300 over three years for Saturday tutoring & sports program for grade 9-13 students of Eritrean descent & other youth of Toronto who are largely new immigrants & potentially high risk.

**Eva's Initiatives, North York Emergency Home for Youth**

\$75,000 over six months towards capital renovation costs of Eva's Phoenix, a hostel with second-stage congregate housing for homeless youth. The project will provide job-site skills development for homeless youth, who are being trained by the building trades as apprentices in the renovation of this former fire truck garage.

**Evergreen Foundation**

\$135,000 over three years to expand the project Where Edges Meet: Celebrating Cultural and Ecological Diversity, an initiative to engage ethnically diverse neighbourhoods in the creation of sustainable community naturalization gardens within City Parks.

**Factory Theatre**

\$205,000 over three years to carry out an audience development initiative which includes air-conditioning the theatre's mainstage; staff training and acquisition of a computerized box office system; and developing a fundraising and community outreach program.

**Family Day Care Services**

\$80,000 over three years to maintain and enhance a Family Resource Program at the Flemingdon Park Community Centre to assist families whose children are not in formal child care.

**Festive Earth Society**

\$103,500 over three years to produce events & educational programs which celebrate environmental renewal & community development.

**Finnish Social Counselling Service of Toronto Inc.**

\$90,600 over three years to allow the counselling service to increase its capacity and maintain existing services while it investigates new opportunities.

**First Night Toronto - Celebration of the Arts**

\$40,000 over one year to mount First Night 2000 - Celebration of the Arts, which offers a safe, family-oriented, community-based, alcohol-free alternative to traditional New Year's Eve revelry.

**Fort York Food Bank**

\$25,000 over one year for a Food Bank and Community Centre serving the downtown Toronto area.

**Franklin Carmichael Art Group**

\$5,000 over three months to purchase a computer to simplify and coordinate the organization's records and to allow the group to have a presence on the Web.

**The Friendly Spike Theatre Band**

\$9,000 over six months to stage 18 performances of Perspectives/Angels of 999, a play developed by a 22-person theatre collective and based on a thesis by Dr. Geoff Reaume, "Psychiatric Patients' History, the Toronto Hospital for the Insane".

**The Fringe: Toronto's Theatre Festival**

\$10,000 over one month to support The Fringe, a two-week annual theatre festival that provides performing opportunities to over 600 artists and 90 theatre companies.

**Gallery 44 Centre for Contemporary Photography**

\$75,000 over two years to mount the Community Links Initiative, a series of projects that will improve membership, outreach and community access to gallery facilities.

**Geneva Centre for Autism**

\$55,000 over one year to fund the Volunteer Support Program, which enhances the centre's capacity to support families of children with autism.

**Go For Green**

\$117,000 over two years to support the Active and Safe Routes to School initiative for school-age children in Toronto, and the creation of a Barrier Identification social marketing tool kit.

**Green Tourism Association**

\$96,200 over three years to promote and develop urban green tourism within the Toronto area which is ecologically sound, fosters appreciation of the city's diverse cultural and natural heritage, and strengthens local communities.

**Hellenic Home for the Aged Inc.**

\$143,500 over five years to support a recreational program for seniors that will provide a broad range of activities, including wellness and nutrition, exercise, crafts, quilting, sign language and outings.

**Heritage Skills Development Centre**

\$40,000 over one year to provide self-employment business development training and a mentoring resource for 50 newcomer women, primarily from African Canadian communities.

**Hope for Children Foundation**

\$168,000 over 31 months for the Chetwynd Community Development Program in Falstaff, a community in Jane Street and Falstaff Avenue, North York.

**Hospital Special Needs Incorporated**

\$15,000 toward replacing a special purpose bus that transports persons with disabilities and the elderly to a variety of recreational activities.

**Hot Docs**

\$25,000 over one year to support the annual five-day festival of international documentary screenings in a conference setting that includes discussions, workshops, networking and a closing night gala.

**IMAGO**

\$165,000 over three years to support SKETCH, a program for homeless and street-involved youth which uses art as a vehicle to address challenging issues and develop employment and life skills.

**Indian Art-I-Crafts of Ontario**

\$50,000 over one year to produce the Canadian Aboriginal Festival at Skydome, the largest First Nations event in Canada. The festival provides economic development opportunities and showcases native crafts, visual and performing arts and other positive aspects of the native community.

**Inside Out Film Festival Inc.**

\$89,900 over three years to support the Toronto Gay and Lesbian Film and Video Festival through contributions to its Youth Digital Video Project, its program guide & membership drive. Support is also provided for the acquisition of computer/video equipment for use in its library and screening room.

**The International Children's Institute**

\$25,000 over six months to work in partnership with key program providers to conduct research on inclusive practices in recreational programming.

**The Justina M. Barnicke Gallery**

\$5,700 over two months to support a project that teaches students about the use of art in exploring community history and issues that affect their lives.

**Kensington Youth Theatre and Employment Skills**

\$175,000 over three years to support the agency's work with street youth in Toronto, including a 17-week theatre and education program to help youth get off the street and become more self-sufficient.

**The Kiwanis Music Festival of Greater Toronto**

\$25,900 over three months to purchase computer equipment to increase the efficiency of the organization, which hosts a popular annual music and performing arts festival for children.

**Korean Canadian Women's Association**

\$30,000 over 18 months to support a training program that will combine training on small business development, employment readiness and sewing skills geared to increase employment opportunities in the sewing industry.

**Lakeshore Arts**

\$30,000 over one year to develop The Friends of the Assembly Hall Community Play Project which will culminate in a Forum Theatre Pageant Play at the revitalized hall in South Etobicoke.

**The Learning Disabilities Association of North York**

\$113,000 over three years to support a joint initiative of three Toronto area Learning Disabilities Associations to provide support and services to individuals struggling with learning disabilities.

**Low Income Families Together**

\$25,000 over one year to establish as a pilot project an after-school gardening & summer nature study program for kids 6-12 years of age from low-income families, teaching children how to grow, harvest, sell, & enjoy the products of community gardening.

**Mary Centre of the Archdiocese of Toronto**

\$75,000 over three years to continue the Respite Care Program which allows individuals with developmental disabilities to stay in the community by providing respite to consumers and their caregivers.

**Meta Centre for the Developmentally Disabled**

\$105,000 over three years to provide employment and pre-employment training opportunities to over 100 adults with developmental disabilities. Participants are expected to acquire gainful competitive employment, or internship placement with private sector employers.

**Metro Toronto Chinese & Southeast Asian Legal Clinic**

\$25,000 over six months to provide workshops to the Vietnamese Canadian community on the justice system and various legal issues.

**Metropolitan Toronto Habitat for Humanity Inc.**

\$37,500 over two years to support a program that uses donated and used building materials to generate revenues for building low-cost housing.

**Mid-Toronto Community Services Inc.**

\$68,900 toward the purchase of a wheelchair-accessible bus that will provide transportation for frail seniors and people with disabilities to participate in community-based programs and to access needed services.

**Mooredale Concerts**

\$10,000 over one year to support the Mooredale Concert series and its youth orchestra.

**Municipal Chapter of Toronto IODE**

\$59,900 over three years to support a part-time staff person and replace old computer equipment.

**Museum for Textiles**

\$65,400 over ten months to purchase upgraded telephone and computer infrastructure systems to increase the organizational capacity of Canada's only museum exclusively devoted to the collection, exhibition and documentation of textiles.

**National Congress of Italian-Canadians - Toronto Dist**

\$13,000 over nine months to support the establishment of a web-based directory of Italian Canadian community organizations, primarily from the Greater Toronto Area.

**National Council of Jewish Women of Canada - Toronto Section**

\$83,800 over two years to support a variety of projects, including technology enhancement; donor/volunteer database development; and the annual Passover food drive, an initiative that supports community food access programs.

**National Shevchenko Musical Ensemble Guild of Canada**

\$10,000 over ten months to conduct an organizational review.

**Native Canadian Centre of Toronto**

\$137,700 over four years to support computer technology, a Local Area Network, internet access and staff training to increase the effectiveness of agency operations.

**Native Child and Family Services of Toronto**

\$75,000 over four months to support an organizational development program that will increase the agency's fundraising capacity and sustain its services to disadvantaged children and youth.

**The Necessary Angel Theatre Company**

\$22,500 over three months for computer technology upgrade and staff training, including a customized database, a box office system and development of a website.



**Nellie's**

\$75,000 over one year to renovate and repair the 33-bed shelter for women and children.

**New Directions**

\$114,400 over three years to support a variety of initiatives, including programs and services for women who have experienced the loss of a partner and organizational development activities designed to increase the capacity of the agency to respond to increased demand for services.

**Nightwood Theatre**

\$90,000 over three years to support membership development activities, including an outreach campaign to identify, increase the involvement of, and better serve, the needs of the theatre's audience and community.

**North York Senior Games**

\$15,000 over three years to increase the effectiveness of the North York Senior Games which provides opportunities for seniors and adults (55+) to get involved in sports activities.

**Oolagen Community Services**

\$180,000 over three years to support a school-based mental health program for youth and to facilitate coordinated service delivery between service providers in the Thorncliffe Park and Flemingdon Park neighbourhoods.

**Operation Springboard**

\$92,000 over two years to engage local citizens and businesses in crime prevention.

**People and Organizations in North Toronto**

\$8,000 over one year to purchase new computer technology to increase efficiency in administration, fundraising and membership outreach.

**Phoenix Community Works Foundation**

\$155,000 over three years for a citywide initiative to protect and enhance Toronto's urban forest, with a focus on residential neighbourhoods.

**The Power Plant Contemporary Art Gallery at Harbourfront Centre**

\$25,000 over three months to conduct a feasibility study and produce a business plan for the proposed, self-sustaining, information facets of the gallery.

**Resource Library for the Environment and the Law**

\$25,000 over two years to design & develop an electronic resource library catalogue on environmental issues that will be available on the Internet through the Library's web site.

**Rexdale Community MicroSkills Development Centre**

\$71,000 over two years to support the Women's Enterprise and Resource Centre, a skills development program that provides business development training to newcomer and low-income women and resources for micro-enterprises.

**Riverdale Community Business Centre**

\$80,000 over 18 months to revitalize East China Town by hiring a Business Support Services Officer to increase economic opportunities for Riverdale's Chinese community.

**Rouge Valley Foundation**

\$24,000 over two years to support a program coordinator and hire a part-time community specialist to focus on outreach and raise public awareness of the Conservation Centre.

**Royal Canadian Legion Branch 258**

\$19,000 over one month to install automatic door openers to provide access for disabled and frail seniors and adults who attend educational and recreational programming.

**Salon du livre de Toronto**

Operating grant of \$50,000 over one year towards the activities of the 2000 Salon du livre de Toronto (Toronto French Book Fair).

**Scarborough Distress Centre**

\$10,000 over one year to support computer equipment and training to assist the agency's telephone answering volunteers with easier and more efficient access to referral agencies for people in distress.

**Scarborough Gym-Elites Club Inc.**

\$94,400 over two years to support a variety of programs, including organizational development, program delivery, outreach and membership development.

**The Scarborough Philharmonic**

\$75,000 over three years to present and promote a Summer Series of classical concerts at various Toronto outdoor locations.

**Scarborough Support Services for the Elderly Inc.**

\$74,600 over one year to support a transportation and a meals on wheels program for vulnerable adults and persons with disabilities.

**Scarborough Women's Centre**

\$375,000 over five years to support the implementation of a comprehensive Economic Self-Sufficiency program to assist women leaving abusive environments to make a successful transition to financial independence.

**Scouts Canada Greater Toronto Region Council**

\$37,100 over three years for the Scoutabout, a weekly summer day camp operating in city parks.

**Serve Canada Youth Service Organization**

\$132,900 over three years to increase the capacity of the organization through fundraising, program evaluation, and long term planning in order to increase access to skill development opportunities for disadvantaged youth.

**Silent Voice**

\$8,500 over two months to mount four American Sign Language (ASL) translated performances of Shakespeare's King John for the deaf and deafened community as part of an annual outdoor Shakespeare festival at Toronto's Withrow Park.

**The Sir William Campbell Foundation**

\$20,000 over two years to make digitized images of the foundation's collection of Upper Canada artifacts available electronically to students, researchers and the general public via a proprietary domain on the Internet.

**Society of St. Vincent de Paul, Toronto Central Council**

\$42,000 over one year for the society's Stores Division, which supplies free and low cost furniture and clothing to people across the Greater Toronto Area.

**Soundstreams Canada**

\$25,000 over one year to produce the 2nd biennial Northern Encounters, July 5-22, 1999, celebrating the arts and culture of the eight circumpolar nations: Canada, Iceland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Alaska (USA), and Siberia (Russian Federation).

**South Asian Family Support Services**

\$40,000 over one year to provide anti-violence training to 14 community mentors and 45 men and youth. The training will focus on violence against women and the manual will be translated into Hindi and Urdu.

**South Riverdale Community Health Centre**

\$90,800 over two years to support a community arts project that includes an oral history, producing a play, creating murals in public spaces, and conducting eco-tours to promote a sense of community and community pride.

**Sporting Clube Portugues de Toronto**

\$18,000 over one year toward sports and cultural programming for the club's more than 300 members and their families, and to support the purchase of a used passenger van for sports teams and the dance troupe.

**St. Alban's Boys' and Girls' Club**

\$225,000 over four years for the Jane and Finch Boys and Girls Club to provide sports and recreation activities for 250 children and youth in two neighbourhood locations.

**St. Christopher House**

\$180,000 over three years to develop and deliver a volunteer development program.

**St. Clair West Services for Seniors**

\$57,600 over two years to support an organizational development project that will result in increased effectiveness of programs and services for seniors.

**St. Patrick's Parish**

\$25,000 over one year to complete a kitchen renovation in the parish hall, where meals are prepared for the Out of the Cold program.

**The Storytellers School of Toronto**

\$65,000 over two years to strengthen the school's programs and infrastructure. The school acts as a centre for storytelling in Ontario and produces the annual Toronto Festival of Storytelling.

**Strength to Walk in Freedom Together**

\$25,000 over one year to open three community support programs in York Region, Scarborough and Peel Region.

**Studio 123 Early Learning Centre**

\$25,000 over one year to purchase artistic materials and equipment for this community-initiated early learning centre.

**Swansea Historical Society**

\$25,000 over 15 months to support the creation of a Community Archives Room where the public can access 7,000 original documents in the Village of Swansea's historic old Town Hall building.

**Tafelmusik**

\$15,000 over one year to support Tafelmusik's music education program, which includes free

educational concerts, discounted tickets for regular concerts, and in-depth class instruction for high school students culminating in a performance.

**Tapestry New Opera Works**

\$73,300 over two years to support the organization's infrastructure, to implement new marketing and outreach initiatives and to increase international sales activities.

**Tarragon Theatre**

\$75,000 over seven months to renovate the theatre's lobby, sound-proof one of its performance venues, and install an elevator to make it wheelchair accessible.

**Theatre Direct Canada**

\$22,800 over one year to assist in expanding Theatre Direct Canada's capacity for outreach to young people, ticket-buyers, the media & corporate donors; through an upgrade in technology & increase in staff time & training.

**Théâtre français de Toronto**

\$25,000 over one year to increase Théâtre Français de Toronto's revenue-generating capacity and expand its programming with particular outreach to the youth.

**Times Change Women's Employment Service**

\$10,000 over three months to upgrade computer equipment for the organization, which offers employment counseling, job search support and a computer training program.

**Tobias House Attendant Care Inc.**

\$150,000 over three years to assess individual needs in learning, literacy, job skills and life skills for residential clients, and to provide program development for front-line staff and volunteers.

\$127,700 over one year to renovate the gallery and purchase computers and equipment. This will provide the downtown Toronto facility with better physical and technological tools to meet the needs of community photographers and participants.

**Goodwill Industries of Toronto**

\$100,000 over six months to purchase material handling equipment, storage containers and computers to ensure more efficient operations of this community organization located in Toronto.

**Grand Ravine Youth Centre Collaborative c/o St. Alban's Boy's and Girl's Club**

\$125,000 over one year to build an addition to the Jane and Finch Boys and Girls Club facility in North York. The expanded program space will increase access to safe recreation for children and youth in the community.

**Heritage York**

\$14,300 to purchase an industrial dishwasher, whiteboard, screen and LCD projector. These items will help to upgrade the community meeting space at Lambton House, a volunteer-run historic building in the old city of York.

**The Hockey Association for the Developmentally Challenged (HADC)**

\$16,000 to help fund an annual international special hockey tournament in North York. Six hundred players with disabilities on 40 teams from across North America and England will attend, promoting healthy recreation for people of all abilities.

\$98,000 over six months to renovate and complete a barrier-free community meeting and program room at the West End YMCA. The room will be made available to local agencies and community groups.

**Age d'or du Sacré-Coeur de Toronto Inc.**

\$40,000 over one year to make the entrance of this downtown seniors group's building accessible to people with disabilities and mobility issues. A ramp will be constructed and automatic doors will be installed.

**Art of Time Ensemble (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$163,500 over three years to expand the ensemble's organizational capacity and reach a broader audience for classical music in Toronto by hiring administrative support.



**Arts For All Playground c/o Jumblies Theatre (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$255,000 over four years to establish a community arts training and mentorship institute for culturally diverse, emerging and established artists. It will foster leadership skills in Central Etobicoke, Downtown West and North Central Toronto.

**Canadian Opera Company (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$82,700 over one year to install a volunteer kiosk at Toronto's Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts. The kiosk will provide a fully accessible space for volunteers with the Canadian Opera Company and the National Ballet of Canada.

**Centre for Social Innovation (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$91,300 over six months to improve the services shared by over 75 not-for-profit organizations in downtown Toronto by purchasing furniture and office equipment. These organizations' capacity to achieve their missions will be enhanced.

**Church Street Pipe Band**

\$10,500 over six months to increase participation in this Toronto band by purchasing musical instruments and offering an enhanced free educational program.

**Clean Air Champions (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$117,700 over two years to implement the Clean Air Achievers Program in Toronto schools. It will encourage youth aged 11 to 15 years to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve their fitness levels through active modes of transport and lifestyle. (Additional grants of \$21,800 to Eastern Ontario and \$10,500 to Halton-Pell will support this activity.)

**The Corporation of Massey Hall and Roy Thomson Hall (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$100,000 over six months to replace the outdated exterior electronic sign at Toronto's Roy Thomson Hall. The renovation will improve branding, artists' profiles and power efficiency.

**Fred Victor Centre**

\$223,000 over three years to improve community access to services for adults who are homeless and marginalized in Toronto's East Downtown community. Funding will help renovate the centre's reception area and expand outreach and referral services.

**Greenest City Environmental Organization**

\$222,000 over 21 months to engage and empower Toronto's youth at risk and marginalized adults to be leaders in their community. They will learn to increase local food security, strengthen community ties and develop special skills.

**La Passerelle (Centre des Jeunes Francophones de Toronto) (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$75,000 over two years to hold a job fair that will increase career opportunities in non-traditional trades for Toronto Francophone students. The centre's office space will also be renovated and equipment purchased. (An additional grant of \$55,000 to Halton-Peel will support this activity.)

**La Société d'histoire de Toronto (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$95,000 over three years to increase public awareness of the Sentier Partagé/Shared Path Park, featuring historic trails along the Humber River. The Toronto park is a celebration of the Aboriginal, French and English people who shared this path.

\$56,500 over one year for board and staff development and to improve fundraising practices as the organization adopts a hierarchical operating model. The organization will then better serve women with mental illnesses in East Downtown Toronto.

\$147,500 over two years to expand the Pathways to Education project in Toronto's Regent Park neighbourhood. New initiatives will help students be mentors and be mentored, and will support vocational students and students with learning disabilities.

\$75,000 over 14 months to improve customer service, marketing and communications for this Toronto community theatre by installing a ticketing and database software.

**Toronto Dance Theatre (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$12,400 to replace the dance floor, ensuring a safer environment for students and performers of this contemporary dance ensemble located in Toronto.

**Toronto Renewable Energy Cooperative (grant has city-wide impact)**

\$202,500 over three years to expand energy education programs, reaching more participants of all ages through the Annual Kids' World of Energy Festival, the Renewable Energy Bike Tours education program and a documentary on renewable energy.

\$14,200 to move and store office contents, and purchase floor coverings and furniture. The choir's office space will be renovated and refurbished to improve working conditions for staff and volunteers.

**Toronto Signals Band**

\$15,000 over six months to purchase new equipment and instruments. These new tools will enable band members to continue providing high-quality performances at the many community events in which they participate.

**Toronto Welsh Male Voice Choir**

\$6,800 over one year to purchase portable risers. The choir will be able to perform in more venues and to larger audiences, expanding its programming and encouraging appreciation of Welsh culture.

**Toronto Youth Wind Orchestra**

\$66,000 over one year for staff, new instruments and transportation costs to present a matinee concert series to middle- and high-school students. A band camp will be established to enhance young people's exposure to music.

**York Community Services Centre**

\$84,800 over six months to purchase a 14-seat accessible minibus. The vehicle will transport seniors, youth, young families, and local residents of all abilities to health and community services at the new Weston/Mount Dennis/Trethewey community hub.

**YOU Dance c/o National Ballet of Canada**

\$75,000 over seven months for staff to expand the Youth Outreach and Understanding (YOU) dance program. Canada's National Ballet school will co-present performances and workshops to more than 10,000 students across Toronto.

**Alzheimer Society of Toronto**

\$150,000 over eight months toward renovations to co-locate three Alzheimer Societies: Toronto, Ontario and Canada. This will decrease overhead costs and increase access to coordinated services and resources for clients with dementia across Toronto.

**API Run Jump Throw Inc.**

\$13,500 over six months to purchase 15 sets of RunJumpThrow equipment. The kits will be

used to train instructors and deliver this Athletics Canada program to engage children in healthy activity throughout Toronto.

**Art on the Move Group c/o Arts Etobicoke**

\$206,000 over three years for staff, communications and administration to produce art-wrapped buses. Artists and community groups will creatively paint buses to become travelling artworks in the GTA, crossing boundaries, cultures and neighbourhoods.

**Aspergers Society of Ontario**

\$9,800 to purchase a computer, office equipment, and furniture for the organization's office in Toronto. This will increase the society's capacity to provide effective assistance to individuals with Asperger Syndrome and their families.

**Beaches Jazz Festival Society**

\$250,000 over 42 months for staff, staging and artists' fees to develop a year-round Youth in Jazz Program in Toronto. The program will nurture young jazz musicians and help to teach youth about this music genre.

\$68,000 over two years for staff, expenses and administration to implement an action plan to

enhance the wellness of Francophone school-age children, youth and their parents. Education will be provided about healthier lifestyles and improved diets.

**Emerging Arts Professional Network**

\$55,000 over two years for staff and administrative help to provide community support networks, mentorship, volunteer involvement and professionals development opportunities for emerging arts in Toronto.

**Evergreen**

\$223,400 over three years for staff, garden supplies and expenses to expand community gardens in three Toronto neighbourhoods. Spaces will be transformed to contribute to greater individual, community and environmental health and well-being.

**The Gatehouse Child Abuse Investigation and Support Site**

\$50,000 over one year for a webmaster, training and website development to provide on-line support to staff, volunteers and abuse victims. An age-appropriate website will be built to support children and youth not yet ready to disclose abuse.

**The Parkdale Village Arts Collective Inc.**

\$25,000 over one year for a gallery director and consultant fees to review the gallery's financial structure and develop a long-term business plan. This will strengthen the gallery's ability to continue providing arts education programs in Parkdale.

**Psychology Foundation of Canada**

\$225,000 over three years for a program co-ordinator, translation costs and communications to help build the capacity of the social-service system to address the mental-health needs of newcomer families in Scarborough.

**Salon du livre de Toronto**

\$145,400 over six months to purchase and install computers, equipment and software. This will enhance the organization's technological and operational capacity, ensuring relevant and high-quality training for immigrant job seekers in Toronto.

\$190,000 over three years for a co-ordinator to develop fundraising strategies and support audience development and volunteers. Arts programs will be enhanced for members of the community challenged by addiction and mental-health issues in Toronto.

**African Canadian Social Development Council**

\$65,000 over two years to enhance the delivery of after-school support programs in Toronto. A plan will be implemented to encourage low-income and African-Canadian children and youths to improve their educational achievements and stay in school.

**Alameda Theatre Company**

\$150,000 over three years to build the capacity of this Latin American theatre company in Toronto. The initiative will engage artists and youth within the Latin American community through outreach, audience development, training and mentorships.

**Alliance Française de Toronto**

\$8,000 to hold a Francophone concert entitled Féminin Pluriel in June 2010 at Glenn Gould Studio in Toronto. The program will celebrate the 15th anniversary of Oasis Centre des Femmes and the role of women in society.

**Anne Johnston Health Station**

\$14,700 over two years to conduct outreach and deliver an adapted exercise program for people with physical disabilities in North Toronto. This will increase participation in recreation by supporting a healthy and physically active lifestyle.

**Batuki Music Society**

\$13,500 over one year to purchase computers, printers and other office equipment. This Toronto-area African arts-and-music organization will then be able to produce its own promotional materials and develop and maintain an informational website.

\$21,100 over one year to adapt a micro-enterprise program for high-school students in entrepreneurial and environmental skills. This collaborative project will be done with Éco-Ambassadeurs and provide students from Toronto-based Francophone schools with opportunities to develop their creativity, autonomy, self-confidence, sense of responsibility, solidarity and leadership.

**Réseau de développement économique et d'employabilité, as lead organization on this collaborative**

\$209,200 over three years to improve volunteer coordination and training, increase partnerships and raise the profile of the Kompa-Zouk Festival, a festival of Franco-Caribbean culture. This event takes place at the end of July and attracts Toronto residents and tourists of all backgrounds.

**Scouts Canada 32nd Toronto Scout Group**

\$30,000 over one year to install a septic system and construct a permanent all-season shelter at Camp Wilcox, which provides camping experience to Boy Scouts from the west end of Toronto.

**Somali Canadian Association Of Etobicoke**

\$39,900 over one year to enhance the economic prospects of 50 Etobicoke youth and young adults through leadership training and mentoring that will enhance their career development and abilities to find and successfully hold jobs in the Canadian job market..

**St. Alban's Boys' and Girls' Club**

\$225,000 over four years to provide youth programming in Toronto's priority neighbourhood of Weston-Mount Dennis at two locations, building on an after-school program for children aged 6 to 12 and providing daily opportunities for youth 13 years and older to engage with fellow community members in a meaningful way.

**SuiteLife Arts For Youth**

\$23,200 over six months to support a youth arts festival in Scarborough Village planned by youth and young adults that will provide them with opportunities to participate in workshops with

industry professionals, gain entertainment industry knowledge and receive support to enhance their individual and collective performances.

### **AfriCan Theatre Ensemble**

\$150,000 over three years to hire an outreach coordinator to build organizational infrastructure to support outreach and educational activities in Toronto, increase revenues, grow the Ensemble's audiences and develop strong relationships with community partners.

### **Agincourt Community Services Association, as lead organization on this collaborative**

\$227,100 over three years to strengthen the work of the The Middle Childhood Matters Coalition, which works to enhance the quality and availability of after-school and summer programs for children aged 6 to 12. Information, resources and workshops will be provided to parents and community agency staff across Toronto.

### **Art City in St. James Town**

\$85,200 over two years to expand multi-disciplinary art programs for the youth and children of the St. James Town neighbourhood of Toronto. \$100,000 over two years to apply the "common resources" work of Nobel-prize-winning economist Elinor Ostrom to enlivening urban parks by supporting the efforts of local groups and creating an accessible database of resources related to park usage in order to increase access to ten parks across Toronto.

**The Paradigm Shift Project**

\$2,600 over one year to publish four educational resources for elementary, secondary and post secondary students on important global issues from poverty to environmental sustainability. These kits will be piloted in Toronto-area classrooms and final versions made available for free to Ontario educators.

**La Franco-Fête de la communauté urbaine de Toronto**

\$210,000 over three years to support the growth of Toronto's biggest festival of Francophone culture in order to expand its school programming, better serve its diversified clientele and establish a stronger financial base.

**Manifesto Community Projects Inc. , as lead organization on this collaborative**

\$50,000 over nine months to support the redevelopment of shared space used by arts, recreation and youth-focused organizations in west Toronto. Information technology infrastructure will be updated and plans for further enhancements created. This will support the development of a dynamic, creative hub for youth organizing, programming, and community building.

**Mayworks Festival of Working People and the Arts**

\$11,900 over six months to purchase computer equipment and software to enhance the organization's efficiency. This will ensure the Toronto labour arts festival runs more smoothly and archiving of festival information is improved.

\$4,400 over three months to renovate and make accessible the washrooms of this facility, which is used by Toronto Island seniors for social and recreational programming.

**tiger princess dance projects**

\$93,500 over two years to develop a community art project combining literature and contemporary dance created specifically for public libraries and community centres in neighbourhoods across Toronto. Developed in workshops by the participants, dancers and authors, the project will culminate in a multidisciplinary dance performance celebrating the artistic and cultural diversity of each community.

**Toronto Kiwanis Boys and Girls Clubs**

\$133,600 over one year to install an elevator, thereby improving access to social and

recreational programming offered at its Spruce Street location in Toronto. This initiative is part of a larger renovation project that will almost double the usable space for youth programming.

**Toronto Non-Contact Hockey League (TNCHL)**

\$99,400 over three years to hire a league administrator, train coaches, purchase equipment and evaluate changing attitudes within hockey in order to enhance the league's ability to provide Toronto's only option for boys and girls aged 11 to 17 to play competitive hockey free of body checking.

**Toronto Reel Asian International Film Festival**

\$207,500 over three years to build organizational capacity by developing new programs and audiences in Richmond Hill, Scarborough and Markham and through increased marketing and outreach activities and equipment upgrades. This grant has an impact in more than one OTF catchment area.

**Toronto Signals Band Inc.**

\$15,000 over six months to purchase new equipment and instruments to enable the band to continue providing high quality performances at Toronto community events.

**Toronto Teen Track Program**

\$96,300 over three years to support evening and weekend sports and recreation opportunities for children and youth in the Morningside Heights community of Scarborough. This program will strengthen players' confidence, physical skill development, teamwork, leadership and healthy living through participation in sports, cooperative games and free play.

**Toronto Urban Music Festival Incorporated**

\$89,700 over two years to develop and implement a number of approaches to decrease the environmental impact of the IRIE music festival and to educate festival-goers on steps that they can take to lessen their own impact.

**TransCare Community Support Services**

\$62,400 over six months to purchase a vehicle to transport seniors and people with disabilities in Scarborough, enabling them to attend to health care appointments, social services and recreational programs.

**West Scarborough Neighbourhood Community Centre**

\$225,000 over three years to expand after-school and school break programs in three Scarborough and North York neighbourhoods. This will increase access to recreational programs and homework help for children while providing leadership roles for local youth and volunteers.

**Women's Art Resource Centre**

\$50,000 over one year to support the Youth Express project, "Collecting Stories - Connecting Cultures," a digital storytelling project for young residents of Crescent Town. This will provide participants with leadership and facilitation skills while gaining expertise in the use of digital communication tools.

**Words in Motion**

\$71,500 over three years to implement the organization's strategic growth and capacity-building initiative. This would support the organization's work providing arts-based education to promote emotional and social literacy for children.

**Working Skills Centre**

\$149,600 over six months to renovate and purchase equipment so that the agency can expand services to meet increased demand for services and ensure programs are accessible. This capital contribution will improve the learning environment for clients, enhance the content and delivery of skills-training programs and increase workplace health and safety.

**Wychwood Open Door Drop-in Centre**

\$42,900 over one year to improve overall efficiency and enhance services to 500 clients annually who are homeless and socially isolated by making essential repairs to the facility and purchasing equipment to improve existing programming.
